Participate and Connect: Be Engaged in the Community

- Focus early literacy programs for preschoolers on building skills in the following areas:
 - Communication and general knowledge for preschoolers. e.g. diversity as a storytime theme
- Programs for parents and caregivers that:
 - Encourage them to talk about and explore the world with their children.
 - Focus on the importance of communication skills for preschool children.
- Measure outcomes or resident benefits that result from these library services.

Understand How to Find, Evaluate, and Use Information: Information Fluency

- Expand on successful digital literacy, information fluency, and Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) library programs in urban and rural settings.
- Measure outcomes or resident benefits that result from library service such as:
 - Acquisition of skills or abilities in these areas, or
 - Feelings of comfort and competence with navigating digital environments.





CULTURAL

Satisfy Curiosity: Lifelong Learning

- Offer programs that focus on creative expression and hands-on activities.
- Build on the Rural Internet Access Program by offering digital literacy training for rural residents and encouraging students to use rural community halls as a study space.
- Continue to work with County schools to get library cards into the hands of students.
- Measure outcomes, or resident benefits, that result from library service such as:
 - Learning something new or gaining creative skills, or
 - Feelings of enjoyment or enhanced quality of life.
