Background

- In the early 2000s there was a desire to enshrine all decision-making guidance within policy, even when the information contained did not meet the standard for policy
- Many policies that were passed in that time frame contain operational direction.



Why are we here?

- Municipalities are bound to follow their policies
- Updated policies enhance effective governance
- In 2014, a program to review the Municipal Policy Handbook was developed, and implementation began in 2015



What is Policy

- Policy is a guideline or principle that provides direction for decision-making and action
- Policies are high-level statements that describe what the County stands for, or what our level or standard of service will be
- Council is responsible to pass policies to:
 - let the public know the County's stance on issues
 - provide guidance when employees need to make a decision that touches on what the County "stands for"
 - establish a standard of service that the County strives to meet



Policy Implementation

- Administration is responsible for implementing Council's policy direction
- Administration can achieve this through the creation of a Directive.
 Directives are similar to a Policy in that they provide high-level administrative direction and are approved by the Chief Commissioner
- Directives apply to any of the responsibilities that have been delegated to the Chief Commissioner by the Municipal Government Act, any other Act, or by Bylaw



Policy Review and Rescission

- Policies should be reviewed regularly for relevance and applicability. At minimum, policies must be reviewed on a three-year cycle
- Policies should be rescinded when
 - they are no longer needed
 - the matter is covered or superseded by other legislation,
 - they are not aligned with Council's current strategic direction
- Rescinding unnecessary policies allows Council to focus on those policies that reflect the current direction



Current State

- The County currently has 178 policies
- Eight new policies under development
- In 2017, Council passed 9 new policies (some of which were replacing outdated policies)
- 60 policies have been reviewed and updated
- 38 policies are currently in the review program, leaving 80 that will need to be addressed, including the 12 that are due for review in 2018
- There will be five policies on today's agenda that Administration is recommending for rescission



Policy Review is a High Priority

- LLS provides expertise and facilitation to internal departments in the development of bylaws, policies, guidelines and procedures
- Legislative and Legal Services has been working with all Strathcona County departments to conduct a thorough policy review
- Under LLS's Corporate Business Plan the target is to have 90% of all policies reviewed and 90% of all Directives and accompanying procedures completed by the end of 2018



Next Steps

- Starting today, Council will begin to see policy review reports on most agendas
- Administration will be bringing forward any one or more of the following:
 - New policies for consideration
 - Proposed amendments to existing policies
 - Proposals to rescind and replace with updated policies
 - Proposals to rescind policies that will be replaced with a Directive
 - Proposals to rescind polices that are no longer necessary (including the five on today's agenda)
- Whenever possible, policies that are interconnected will be brought forward together
