






- A rapid spring melt commenced on Friday April 20
- Transportation and Agriculture Service (TAS) re-prioritized operations staff from typical duties to address the flooding issues.
- Operations team focused efforts on prioritizing and addressing overland flooding issues
- Prioritization has been based on the risk of flooding to essential infrastructure:
  - Highest priorities are homes, arterial roads and water wells flooding, or where flooding is imminent
  - Lowest priority cases include no risk to buildings or infrastructure.

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- Transportation and Agriculture Staff
  - Daytime 36 staff
  - Nighttime 18 staff
- Internal Departments Supporting response efforts



# **Incident Stats**

- 517 Culvert Issues reported >427 Resolved (0700 Today)
- 67 overland flooding concerns
- Crews placed:
  - over 2500 Sandbags
  - 450 feet of Rapid Deploy Water Worms
  - 650 Ton of sand used for home protection
  - 6 6" Pumps active
  - 20 2"-4" Pumps Active





## **Transition Back to Routine**

- Actively inspecting roadways and local bridges to monitor water levels and safe travel for residents
- Slowly transitioning staff back to regular operations (i.e. street sweeping)
- Work together with residents at high-risk locations on a long term sustainable flood mitigation.
