Young Speakers Invitational Speech Competition

Application for Funds from Strathcona County Council

Overview:

Students in grades 4, 5 & 6 from elementary schools in the City of Fort Saskatchewan, Strathcona County, Lamont County, the Town of Bruderheim and Sherwood Park participate in the school level speech competition. From these students, the top speakers in each grade will be selected by a panel of judges to carry on and represent their schools at the final competition. Students selected by their school then compete at the Young Speakers Invitational at their grade level in April on the 18th at 4:00 p.m. in the Agora at Strathcona County Hall. Each student will present an original oratory speech as set out by the tournament rules. Students are then scored on their speeches by a panel of judges. Students receive positive feedback on their oral presentations and winners are announced. Each student, regardless of placement will receive a prize. The event is free to attend and all members of the public are encouraged to take in the competition.

Goals of the Program:

To promote:

- a) Oral communications skills
- b) Critical thinking skills
- c) Student leadership skills
- d) Confidence
- e) Life-long learning

In our hi-tech world, the ability to speak confidently and passionately is becoming more and more an essential 21st century skill. By participating in this program, each student and each school will first and foremost develop an understanding of the benefits and styles of speaking, focusing on the ability to persuade, inform and entertain listeners. All the students involved either at the championship or at the school level will gain life-long skills.

Members of the various school communities will be drawn together to support their students. Cooperation and connectedness between the schools and the community is greatly enhanced by this event, as students from all walks of life can step forward and voice their opinions.

Roots of the Program:

First introduced at Brentwood School by Blair Ching as a school wide speech competition it was carried on by Jordan Smith. Following the success of the program at Brentwood Elementary, two other schools showed interest and thus the Young Speakers Invitational was officially launched in 2009 with three schools participating. In 2010 five schools participated, in 2011 fifteen schools, in 2012 twenty schools, in 2013 twenty-three schools and in 2014 and each year since twenty-four schools. (23 schools in 2018 – going to 25 schools for 2019)

Planned Use of Funds

We are requesting the sum of \$2250 for the Young Speakers Invitational.

The cost of the event breaks down as follows:

- Approximately \$800 for the rental of the Agora, Council Chambers, and additional meeting rooms
- \$1750 for the cost of food and beverages provided to competitors and guests at the event
- Approximately \$2200 for medals, keeper plaques and annuals
- Approximately \$400 for print materials and congratulations cards
- Approximately \$600 for volunteer/meeting/miscellaneous expenses

Council funds would go toward the total expense, with the remainder being covered by an additional sponsor.
