To Whom It May Concern:

Please accept this application for Council Priority Funds from Archbishop Jordan High School. We are requesting funds to provide a graduation token to each of our Indigenous Students upon their graduation at the end of their grade 12 year.

The money provided to ABJ for this event would cover the cost of Eagle feathers for First Nations students, Metis sashes for Metis students, as well as the attendance of an Elder and a Knowledge Keeper to share teachings with the Indigenous graduates, and their families, as well as with all grade 11 and 12 students are the Grad Blessing celebration.

In First Nations cultures, Eagle feathers hold a very important significance, especially when given to those who are encountering a rite of passage, such as graduation. Elder Theresa Strawberry, along with Knowledge Keeper Bernadine Coleman, will be sharing this teaching first with the Indigenous grads, then with the grad class as a whole. The Eagle feather is taught to represent honesty, truth, majesty, strength, courage, wisdom, power and freedom. For Indigenous communities, an Eagle feather is used in ceremonies to call upon the Creator and to command respect and focus on the situation at hand. Presenting this to the graduates calls the graduates to accept the call of the Creator to take care of the feather, and to treat it with the reverence and respect it deserves.

In Metis culture, the sash also holds a great significance. Even today, the sash continues to be an integral part of Metis cultural celebrations. The sash is a symbol of nationhood and cultural distinction, symbolizing pride and identification for Metis people. Presenting this to the graduates during the blessing ceremony allows them to have pride in their heritage, and to show it off so that others may learn about it too.

One of the most important aspects of the Indigenous Graduation Ceremony at ABJ is the interaction and teachings that come with the attendance of Elder Theresa, and Knowledge Keeper Bernadine Coleman. These two amazing ladies bring with them cultural teachings as well as a vehement pride in their cultures. They act as role models for our students, so that they may see the beauty of Indigenous cultures and traditions.

We hope that you will recognize the significance and importance of our Indigenous Grad Ceremony at Archbishop Jordan High School. We believe that this funding would help to provide students with meaningful, authentic representations of their cultures to empower them as they enter the world of adulthood.
