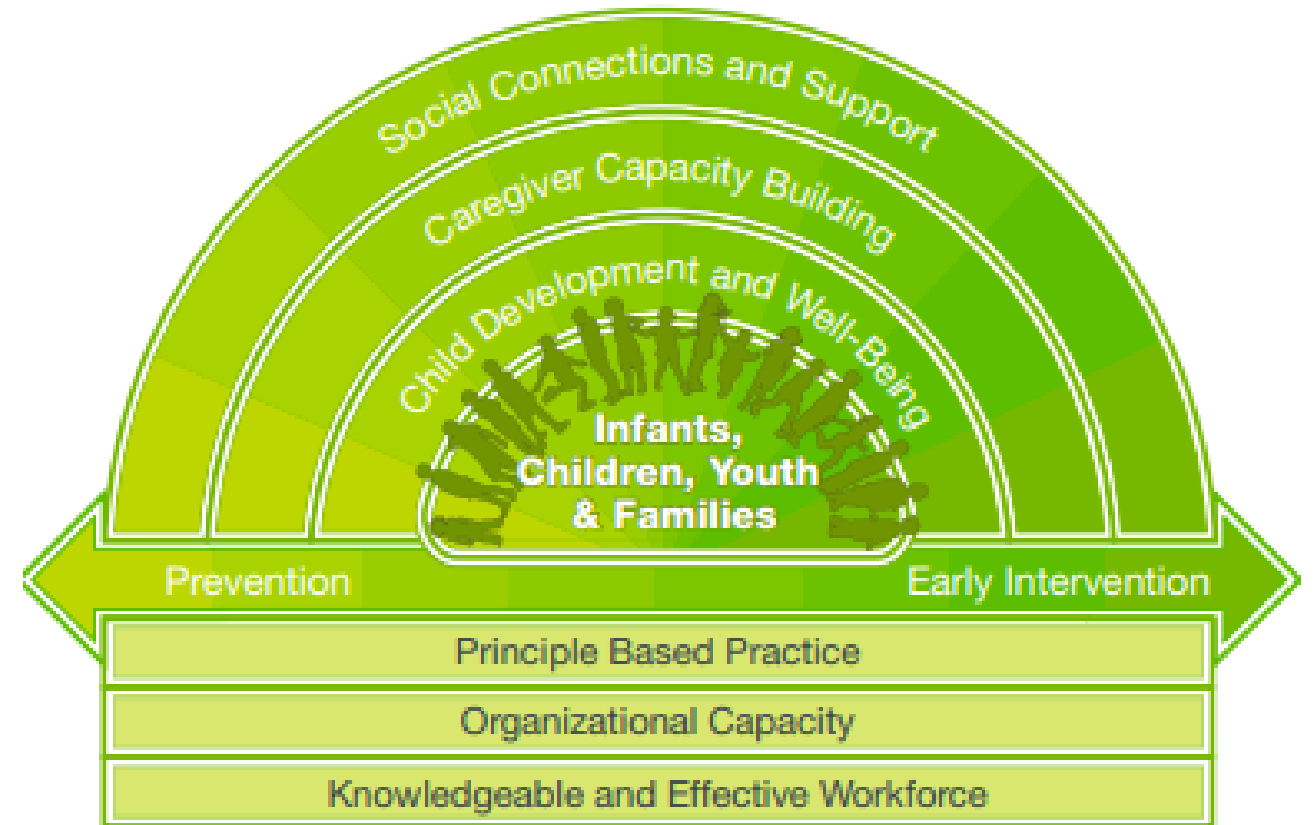

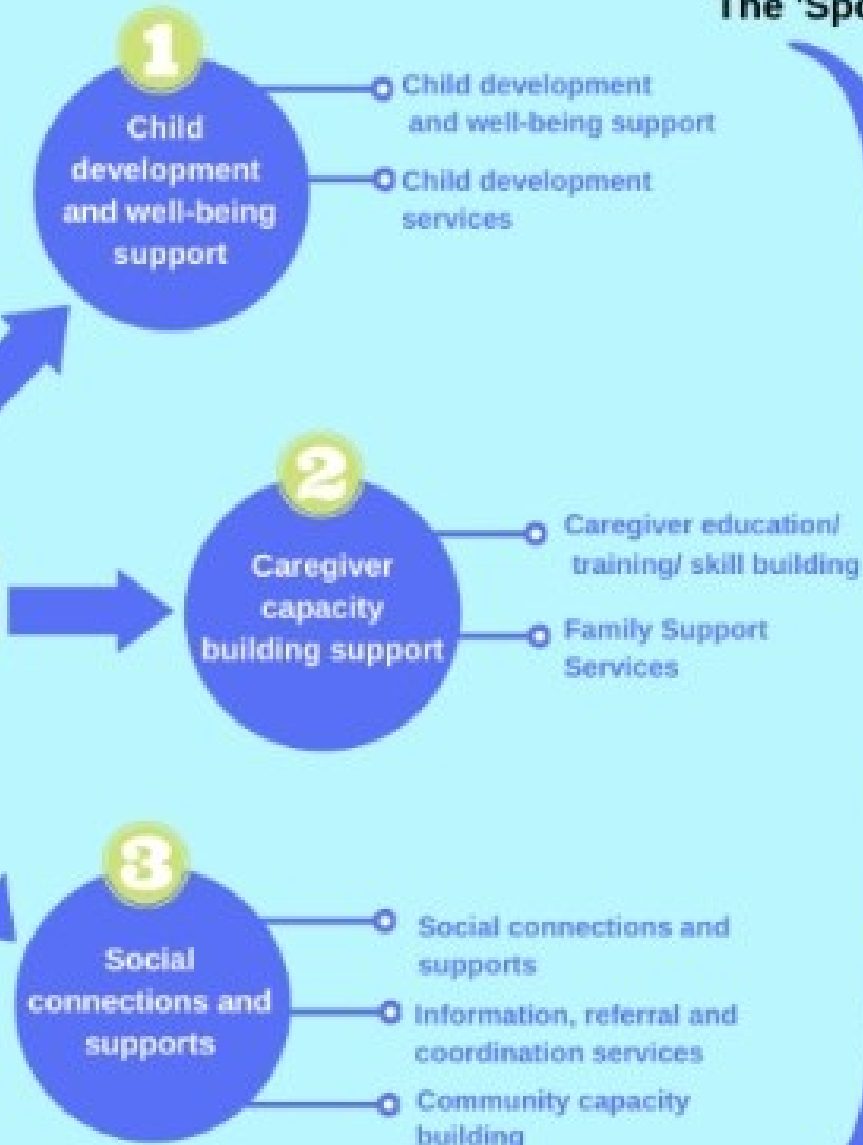
HUB-AND-SPOKE MODEL

'The Hub'

The 'Hub' is the anchor organization that arranges the delivery of a full array of services, supports, and programming. The 'Hub' supports and coordinates both the direct service delivery and formal partnership service delivery of programs and services (the 'Spokes').

'The Spokes'

The 'Spokes' are the network of services and programming delivered to children, youth, and families. These services and programs can be directly delivered by the 'Hub' or delivered by formal community partnerships and collaborations. All services and programs must align with the three core service delivery domains.
