

Moving toward an accessible and inclusive Strathcona County.

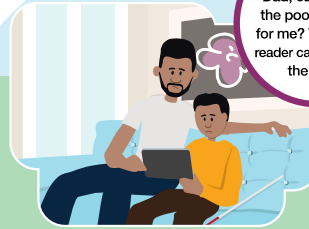
