

Library cardholders borrowed nearly 1.4 million items in 2023. Just under 300,000 of those were in digital formats (eBooks, eAudiobooks, digital magazines and movies), and even more downloaded online articles, newspapers and training videos. But County residents still love books and other print-based materials too!

More people returned to the library and Bookmobile in 2023, with over 438,000 in-person visits combined. Meanwhile, over 32,000 people participated in almost 1400 library program sessions.




