Bylaw 40-2024 Election Bylaw



Background and purpose

- Local Authorities Election Act gives Council authority to pass bylaws on specific topics
- Bylaw 60-2020 Election Bylaw passed November 27, 2020
- Bill 20 amendments to the Local Authorities Election Act
- Seeking first and second reading today for proposed Bylaw 40-2024
- Third reading after Bill 20 proclamation



Part II - election officials



 Appoint as returning officer the Director, Legislative, Legal and Procurement

 Appoint as substitute returning officer the Manager, Legislative Services and Contract Management



Part II - election officials

- Authorize the returning officer to:
 - Create voting subdivisions
 - Designate voting station locations
 - Alter voting subdivision boundaries as needed
 - Post voting instructions in languages other than English in voting stations
 - Set up voting stations at seniors' facilities
 - Establish the locations for receipt of nominations
 - Begin counting the special ballots, advance vote ballots, and institutional ballots at 7:30 p.m. on Election Day
 - Enter into agreements with the school boards to conduct their elections on their behalf
 - Delegate any of their powers, duties, or functions



Part III - election preparation





Require that nominations be accompanied with a \$100 deposit

Provide that if a candidate dies prior to the opening of the voting stations on election day, the election will be discontinued and a by-election will be held



Part IV - election administration

- Set voting hours on election day between 9 a.m. and 8 p.m.
- Allow for special ballots and set out the:
 - Methods for submitting an application
 - Time period for applying for a special ballot
 - Must apply between July 1 and 4 p.m. on election day
 - Deadline for receipt of completed special ballot
 - Must be received by 7 p.m. on election day



Criminal record check - optional

- Three (3) types:
 - 1. Name-based \$50
 - Results show whether a person does or does not have a record
 - Does not show specific conviction
 - Person could optionally declare their specific conviction(s)
 - 2. Vulnerable sector \$50
 - Meant for those in a position of trust or authority over vulnerable persons
 - Checks for criminal record plus any suspensions (pardons) for sexual offences
 - Checks local, non-conviction police records
 - 3. Certified \$84
 - Fingerprints taken and sent to Ottawa for processing
 - Would show what specific convictions are held



Not included in Bylaw 40-2024

We are conducting research and outreach on:

- Moving election day to Saturday
- A blind elector template

Not included in this bylaw:

- Changing the number of required signatures for a nomination
- Printing ballots in lots
- Attending a person's home to facilitate voting for someone who is unable to attend a voting station because of physical disability
- Determining campaign expense limits
