
Council motion

On March 11, 2025, Council passed the following motion:

THAT administration review procurement policies and practices to ensure that the County procures all required goods and services from sources that are Canadian, Albertan and from countries that Canada has a relationship or free trade agreement that is being honoured, and report to Council with options for any next steps by the end of April 2025.



How do we decide a supplier is or is not Canadian?

Strathcona County is governed by various domestic and international trade agreements aimed at removing trade barriers. These agreements promote economic growth, enhance competition, improve product variety and quality, and facilitate the transfer of knowledge, skills, and technology, fostering development and innovation.



Trade agreement thresholds

The County is required to publicly tender for requirements over the threshold.

The lowest threshold is from the NWPTA, requiring public tendering for any amount that exceeds the threshold.



Opportunity 1 - Under threshold

Under \$75,000 for goods and services, \$200,000 for construction.



- No requirement to post tender notices electronically.
- Request quotes direct from local suppliers
- Supplier inquiry list



Opportunity 2 - Buying groups

A buying group, also known as a group purchasing organization (GPO), is an entity that consolidates the purchasing power of multiple organizations to obtain better pricing and terms from suppliers. Examples include:

Opportunity Caution – Buying Groups

Conditions:



•Procurement conducted in alignment with the trade agreements



The County has posted a notice of participation to Alberta Purchasing Connection



Second-stage procurement is not required



The supplier is qualified



The County's requirements are in scope

Opportunity 3 - Trade Agreement Exceptions

Including, but not limited to:

Procurements from public/government bodies

Procurements from philanthropic institutions, prison labour or persons with disabilities

Procurements from a non-profit organization

Procurements of health services and social services

Where it can be demonstrated that only one supplier is able to meet the requirements of a procurement

Where an unforeseeable situation of urgency exists and the goods, services or construction could not be obtained in time by means of open procurement procedure



Trade agreement reporting

All municipalities must report to the Government of Alberta all:

- Procurement exceeding CFTA and CETA thresholds
- Openly competed contracts and direct awards that meet limited tendering criteria

This ensures transparency and compliance with trade agreements.



Opportunity 4 - evaluating social benefit and best value

Social Benefit:

- We can evaluate the social benefit suppliers can offer including in our socio-economic and community benefits that directly impact Strathcona County
- We can use best value procurement which involves a lower weight on price and a higher weight on other factors, including social benefit
- We can evaluate proposed response times when there is a genuine need for timely supply of goods and services. In such cases, the timelines may require proximity to the County

The County is developing a Sustainable/Social/Indigenous Procurement framework, expected to be completed in 2026

Buying local

We procure local, Albertan and Canadian when suppliers are qualified, meet our requirements, and offer the goods and services at a reasonable cost.

Under threshold procurements are managed within departments. To ensure departments are considering local, Albertan and Canadian, Administration will issue a notice reminding the organization to prioritize local suppliers for under-threshold procurements.
